

# Selena Tan and Elaine Chan

THE DIM SUM DOLLIES ARE BACK WITH A NEW CABARET SHOW. CHIEF DOLLY **SELENA TAN** AND MUSICAL DIRECTOR **ELAINE CHAN** TALK HISTORY

**SINGAPORE TATLER:** What was the inspiration behind The History of Singapore?

**CHAN:** It's a pleasant surprise to hear the final product.

**TATLER:** What is the most fun aspect of the show?

CHAN: It's as if we breathe Dim Sum Dollies every minute of the rehearsal. It's the family spirit, the critical comments in order to perfect the show and the milking of every possible laugh.
